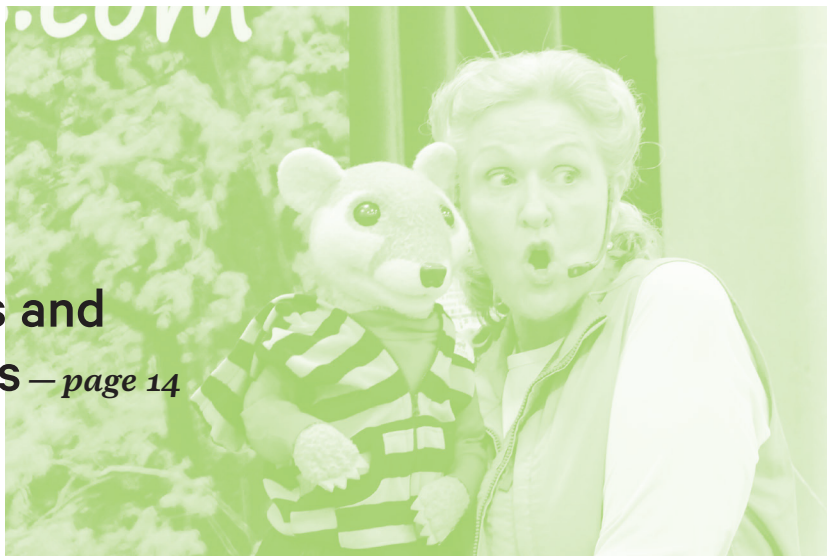

Healthy Habits



Recently, both Deva Kumar and I had the same “God Moment.” You see, a few months ago Deva’s dad, living in India, was experiencing some chest pain. He was scheduled to go into the hospital to have an arterial stent installed. While operating, the physicians realized that this was more serious than they originally thought. Deva’s dad needed open heart surgery. Many people from Converge, our congregation and my fellow classmates at Dubuque Seminary prayed for God to guide the health caregivers. All went well and Deva decided to visit his family in three months. Deva decided that he had let himself get out of shape and went on a healthy eating plan and exercise program to lose almost 30 pounds. While visiting his dad in India, his father had some additional chest pains. Back to the hospital for tests, but this time it was concluded that medication, a strict healthy diet and exercise program for the rest of Deva’s dad’s lifetime, was in order.

While Deva was in India, I had a dream that God wanted Deva to be a “Moses” to the American

Indian population in order to promote a health habits program of proper portions, healthy food, and exercise. When Deva returned from India, I told him of my dream and he looked startled. “Pastor,” Deva said, “while returning from India, I had the same thoughts as in your dream. We concluded that it was truly a “God Moment.”

We decided to share the information in a lesson during a Converge evening. Three young adults and I had a part to present about serving sizes and food groups, exercise, healthy weight and sleep patterns, psychological health and spiritual growth. Most importantly, we realized that those behaviors we practiced over and over eventually would become healthy habits.

I am so proud of these young adults and their efforts to make a difference in the health of their own lives as well as among their friends and colleagues. God’s Peace!

And forgive us our debts as we also have forgiven our debtors... For if you forgive others their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you; but if you do not forgive others, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses.

Matthew 6:12, 14, 15, ESV

1. How we treat others affects how others will treat us. When we pray this petition in The Lord's Prayer, we are asking our Father to deal with us when we trespass against Him as we have dealt with those who have trespassed against us. Jesus emphasizes the point in verses 14 & 15 with a promise that our Father will forgive us if we forgive, but not if we refuse to forgive. In Mark 11:25, Jesus taught that when we pray, we must first forgive anyone we have something against, then our Father will also forgive us.

2. Forgiveness comes from the gracious mercy of God in Christ. As Christians, we are eternally dependent on God's mercy. As sinners, we are under Divine Justice, but when pardoned, we are indebted to Divine Mercy. In our continuing state of grace, our mercy to others continues. As sinners forgiven by God and blessed with eternal love and forgiveness, we would be hypocrites if we did not

forgive others. Let us love and forgive others as God in Christ has loved and forgiven us (*Col. 3:13*).

3. The forgiveness here refers to family forgiveness that we need to maintain fellowship with our Father and each other. This does not relate to judicial forgiveness from the penalty of sin which comes from our faith in the Son of God. This is about relationships; by refusing to forgive those who have wronged us, we weaken our fellowship with each other and with God.

4. Do the guilty trespassers get off free of consequences? No! **Vengeance is mine (not yours), says our Father, I will repay** (*Rom. 12:19*). Our job is to love and forgive and let God's wrath handle judgment. Paul teaches that we are not to be overcome with evil, but to overcome evil with good (*Rom. 12:22*). Do not repay anyone evil for evil,

but take thought of what is noble in the sight of all (*Rom. 12:17*).

5. The Bible emphasizes forgiveness. See:

Matthew 18:21, 22, 35; Mark 11:25; Luke 6:37, 38; 11:4; 17:4; 23:34; Eph. 4:32; Col. 3:13 for some of these teachings.

6. Forgiveness is a major theme of God's revelation. He created us in His own image and then gave us the Creation to live in. We sinned against Him due to our dissatisfaction with His provision. He then created a sacrifice system to

forgive sinners by bearing their sins Himself. By this Divine forgiveness, He brings His family home. Forgiveness is how we enter Heaven.

7. When you pray this petition, be aware of your own sin and your own commitment to forgive others. If we confess our sins, He who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. (*1 John 1:9*). Avoid the pain of living with unconfessed / unforgiven sin. Do not hold grudges!

Greetings from sunny Peru!

Since we are south of the Equator, we're in the middle of a very hot and humid summer here in Lima right now!

While it is hot along the coast, it is the rainy season in the Andes Mountains and the region has received more rainfall than usual. The added rain is causing some of the worst flooding and mudslides in its recorded history, not only in the mountains, but here in Lima, as well. The riverbeds in Lima, that are normally dry or with very minimal water year-round, have turned into raging rivers.

Apart from the excessive rain in the mountains, the city of Lima has received several inches of rain in the last few weeks (a typical year is about 1 inch total). We know that "several inches" of rain does not sound drastic, but it is devastating for Lima which does not have the proper infrastructure to receive rainfall.

The situation is so bad that the government water company periodically shuts off water to the entire city of 10 million people for certain hours of the day. It sounds like this will be a recurring event while it continues to rain in the mountains and city (which could be through March). Thankfully many buildings (including our apartment) have water storage tanks which fill when the water is on ensuring we have a constant supply.

While the flooding is primarily affecting the outskirts of Lima and has not reached where we live, it is a great concern for the city as a whole. Roads have been closed, some bridges have been washed away and many people have had considerable damage of their homes.

Please join us in praying for Lima and the surrounding cities that are affected by all of this.

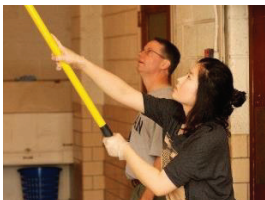

Medical Benevolence Foundation

The Medical Benevolence Foundation is one of thirty-one missions to which our congregation lends financial support through its Outreach and Mission commitment. Mark Harris of MBF met with the Outreach and Mission Committee recently to update the committee on the Foundation's work. MBF partners with local churches in developing countries to build and strengthen sustainable health care systems for impoverished communities. The Foundation targets areas with the highest maternal mortality rate (deaths of mothers due to complications of pregnancy or childbirth) because maternal mortality rate is an effective indicator of a low density of healthcare workers. The density is lowest, and the mortality rate highest, in sub-Saharan countries, including the Congo, Kenya and Malawi, and in Haiti. MBF focuses 80% of its work in these areas, and its efforts are aimed at moving local facilities established by Presbyterian and other denominations to self-reliance by lending its expertise in building infrastructure, training in medical and management systems, processes and competencies, helping to proclaim the Gospel of Christ through medical ministries. Hospital development, nursing schools and scholarships, critical services for women and children, and primary health care clinics are key components of these efforts.

Recent projects include the construction of the new Tumatumu Nursing School building in Kenya. MBF's partner, Nkhoma Mission Hospital in Malawi, implemented a "Safe Motherhood Program" that achieved an 80% reduction in maternal mortality and a significant reduction in infant mortality through increased access to hospital delivery and health care resources.

MBF has a four star rating (out of four possible stars) and an overall score of 91.16 out of 100 from Charity Navigator. Of OMC's 2016 budget of \$30,800, \$2,500 was allocated to MBF. The same amount has been allocated for 2017. Further information about MBF, including opportunities for alternative giving such as purchasing artisan made bracelets from Haiti, is available at the foundation's website, mbfoundation.org.

Five Little-known Facts About Germs

Germs are everywhere and in so many forms, including bacteria, viruses and molds. While it's common knowledge that exposure to germs can lead to illnesses ranging from colds to stomach bugs, there are some steps you can take to help prevent the spread of germs in your personal space. Increase your germ smarts (and protect against illness) with these five little-known facts:

1. Computer keyboards can have more germs than a public toilet. Keys and spaces on a keyboard are prime breeding grounds for bacterial and viral growth. Some reports show five times more germs on a keyboard than on a public toilet (and these are likely cleaned more often!) *Clean your keyboard regularly with specialized wipes for electronics, and remove crumbs and dust with an "air duster" (canister of compressed air sprayed on the keyboard).*

2. Toothbrush covers do not protect your brush from bacteria. While it seems to make sense that covering your toothbrush would protect it, the opposite is the case. With a cover on your brush,

a more humid environment is created and more likely to encourage growth of germs. *Wash your toothbrush when done, and allow it to air dry. Make sure you store it away from the toilet (and keep that lid down!)*

3. Light switches are among the cleanest spots in a hotel room. While multiple reports look at clean and dirty places in a hotel room, among the cleanest are the light switches. The dirtiest tend to be the TV remote control and the telephone. *A good rule of thumb is to always wash your hands with soap and water, carry hand sanitizer and bring along a box of wipes to swab down areas of general use in your hotel room—and anytime you are on the road.*

4. Hand sanitizer does not always replace soap and water washing. Hand sanitizer is great when you're not near a sink, and need to clean your hands. But given the choice of a spritz of sanitizer or good old soap and water, choose the soap and water route. But soap and water are only a better germ fighter when done properly. Lather up and

scrub hard for at least 20 seconds (sing Happy Birthday twice), and wash between your fingers and the back of your hands. *Don't skimp with the hand sanitizer either—cover the same hand areas as for soap and water.*

5. Freezing food does not kill bacteria. If you freeze foods that you suspect might be spoiled (or on their way), freezing them will not kill the bacteria already in the food. Freezing prevents further bacterial growth, but when you thaw it out, the bacteria continue to multiply and contaminate your food. *Avoid freezing foods left at room temperature for more than 2 hours, when bacterial growth escalates.*
