





Philippians 2:12b, 13, esv

God gave us our transforming salvation when we put our faith in Christ. Here Paul teaches us to work out that salvation with God's help. Like new computer software, our faith must be activated to be useful. How can we activate? We can't by ourselves, but as we yield to the Lord, He works in us and we work it out, fulfilling His plan for us (*Eph. 2:10*), and using the spiritual gifts He gave us (*Rom.12:13; 1 Cor. 12*). Living by faith in God teaches us to trust God in the opportunities and challenges of life. As we obey God, we experience the joy (*Psalm 16:11*) of His presence.

God gives us the desire to align our will with His. When we then seek Him, those two wills come together. God works in us, both to guide our will and to work out His good pleasure. The key is our revised will—will we follow God or let our sin

derail our spirituality. Christ has removed our sin, and with God's help, we can overcome our sinfulness and work with Him to accomplish His good pleasure through us. Then we can enjoy Him and each other forever!

Why fear and trembling? The God of the Universe knows each of us, for we are His children whom He loves deeply; He actually loves us enough to enter our lives, to save us from condemnation, and to call us to be in His family with Him and each other forever. We are significant, and as our salvation works out, God is with us to help us grow and become the person He designed us to be. In our loving humility, we live with God and each other; life then becomes truly worth living, and our blessings are eternal!

JOY OFFERING

Christmas Joy Offering

The Christmas Joy Offering celebrates the coming of Jesus Christ, the “Wondrous Gift of God with Us.”

Half of the offering will raise up leaders from small places that are too often overlooked by the church; the historically Presbyterian racially ethnic schools that were founded to educate emerging leaders from underrepresented groups to have church leadership better reflect the diversity of God’s people. The other half of the Christmas Joy offering honors and supports those leaders who serve and have served us well. Through the assistance program of the Board of Pensions, current and retired church workers who experience need because of tragedy, health concerns or financial hardship can receive assistance from the church that they have served so well.

You can designate Christmas Joy on your regular envelope or use one of the Christmas Joy offering envelopes you can find in the narthex. —Joel DeHamer

PER CAPITA

What is Per Capita?

Perhaps you noticed that in your pad of offering envelopes the first one is designated “Per Capita.”

Per Capita is a per member amount that congregations pay to their respective Presbyteries. The amount requested by the Presbytery is a combined total of requests from the Presbytery, the Synod and the General Assembly to support their operations and missions.

Per capita is an opportunity for all communicant members of the Presbyterian Church through the councils (Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly) to participate equally, responsibly and interdependently by sharing the cost of coordination and evaluation of mission; and, of performing ecclesiastic, legislative and judicial functions that identify a Reformed Church, while at the same time strengthening the sense of community among all Presbyterians. Thus, Per Capita is a fundamental way in which nearly 11,000 congregations and councils of the Presbyterian Church (USA) are connected in covenantal relationship and faithfully participate in the work of the wider church (*from the advisory opinion of the General Assembly.*)

For 2017, the Per Capita assessment is \$25.93 per member. Our church’s total portion is \$10,190.49. Each member is encouraged to use the designated envelope to participate directly in the work of the councils of the church.

Converge Update

The Holy Spirit has continued to move in our lives. With the closing of Panera Cares, we were faced with the task of trying to figure out where God would have us go, to be missionally “out in the neighborhood.” It was an immediate suggestion by two of our attendees to have it in the large living space of a four-person apartment in The Fairlane Woods Development (thank-you Deva and Vishwa!).

How awesome (as opposed to awful) this move was, since most of our international students are working on their Master’s degrees, as well as the employed young adults actually live in this community and can walk to Converge each Saturday. Even better yet, they can easily bring friends to experience this particular Presbyterian 1,001 New Worshiping Community.

Traditional Indian and American food, prepared by different members of our community started the afternoon gathering, followed by worship, a message and more interactive small group activities and discussion. Harsh, a member of our group from U of M-Ann Arbor recently said, “I love this community of faith. This is how the book of Acts church in the Bible was like; meeting in houses,





eating a meal and being involved in each other's lives all during the week."

So, how are we involved in each other's lives during the week? Just recently, in one week alone, seven of us spent an afternoon and moved a member of Converge from one apartment complex to the Woods. Two other members spent two evenings trimming the bushes of a member of our congregation to earn a little pocket cash. Another member of Converge volunteered to work two late nights at ChristNet. A number of members have one-on-one or group Bible studies during the week. Meals are cooked and shared with members of the group on a regular basis. Rides to the Treasure Chest for household items as well as a dentist visit are given. Eleven of us descended upon Apple Charlie's Cider Mill for an afternoon. The list goes on and on!
