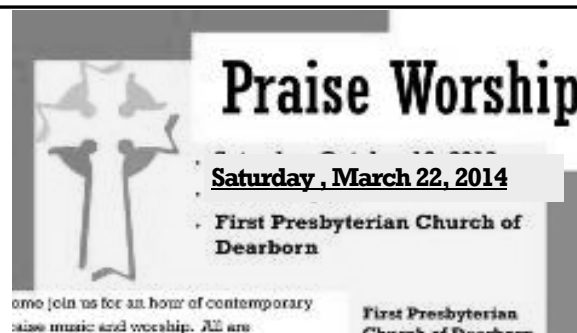

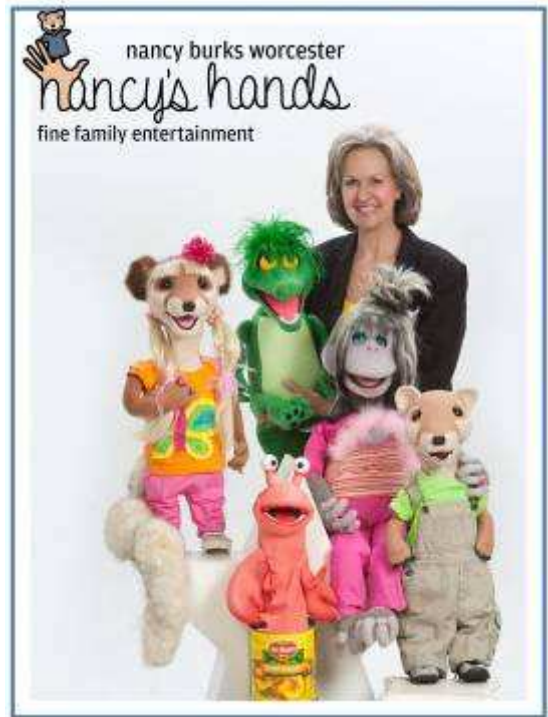
Giggles & Grub!

Musings from Pastor Mike - March 2014

Mission has been a large part of the Presbyterian Church since The Reformation. We Presbyterians take to heart the words of James found in James 1:22-25.

“But be **doers** of the word, and **not hearers only**, deceiving yourselves. For if anyone is a hearer of the word and not a doer, he is like a man observing his natural face in a mirror; for he observes himself, goes away, and immediately forgets what kind of man he was. But he who looks into the perfect law of liberty and continues in it, and is not a forgetful hearer but a doer of the work, this one will be blessed in what he does.”

The opening sentence in this passage **commands us** in a positive and negative manner. The first part of the sentence, “But be doers of the word”, directs us to take action. Jesus told us many times to do exactly the same thing. “Not everyone who says to me, ‘Lord, Lord,’ shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he **who does the will of my Father** in heaven.” – Matthew 7:21. John Calvin wrote that “the doer is he who from the heart embraces God’s word and testifies by his life that he really believes.” In the second part of the sentence, “and not hearers only”, James **opposes hearing only**. The Word of God is a command, a trumpet, an appeal for action!

The final part of the opening sentence is a **warning**, “deceiving yourselves”. The word that James uses, in the original Greek, means “to reckon wrong” or literally, “to reason falsely”. That’s like listening to a message by a pastor, hearing a Sunday school lesson, or reading Scripture, and then reasoning that the Holy Spirit wants you to take a nap!

In the final part of the passage, “For if anyone is a hearer of the word and not a doer, he is like...” James gives us two examples. The first one is what we should **not do**, namely to look into the mirror (God’s Word) and to walk away from it (“out of sight, out of mind”). The second example is the correct one. James uses a Greek word that means “to stoop down to get a good look”, not once, but continuously. The Psalmist confirms this when he wrote, “But his delight is in the law of the Lord, and on this law he meditates day and night.” – Psalm 1:2. At the end of this scripture, James closes with, “this one will be blessed in what he does.” **Doing God’s Word** is the path to blessing and joy. “Now that you know these things, you will be blessed if you do them.” – John 13:17.

I am happy to report that the GrouPeru! ’14 Mission Team is nearly solidified. Notes from our Parish Nurse

Did you know that for the first time in the history of the United States, single adults outnumber married adults? According to the 2011 Census & the Barna Group 52% are single and 48% are married. This is an important statistic. It means that if the Church is going to be an effective entity in reaching our neighbors for Christ, we are going to have to make changes in how we weave single people into the corporate life of the church. According to Katelyn Beaty, in an article of In Touch Magazine, “the word corporate may draw to mind a business boardroom or a three-piece-suited CEO, but in fact it means “united in one body” or “corpus”. Thus, it carries rich biblical resonance. Paul uses the image of the body to talk about spiritual gifts in the church of Corinth: “There should be no division in the body, but...its parts should have equal concern for each other. If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it” (1 Cor. 12:25-26 NIV).”

What a beautiful illustration. And while that Scripture has been there from the beginning, unfortunately, the church has not done as much as it should to help single people feel like an integrated part of the family. Having said that, now is the perfect time to start! So, what might that look like? First of all, it is always important for there to be opportunities for people who have some common ground to meet and be able to interact with each other. In the past year-and-a-half, there has been a group that meets for just that purpose. The group is known as S.O.A.R. (Singles Outreach And Renewal), and is coordinated by Lynn Campbell (misslynn719@hotmail.com). But that is only a small part of the big picture. What is more important, is to integrate singles into all areas of the church, and value the gifts of who they are and the unique spiritual gifts that they bring to the body of Christ.

Dr. Stanley points out some of the unique qualities/gifts single people bring: “1) A witness to the church that abundant life flows from the resurrection, not just from biology. They reveal that we come into the community of faith not by a womb, but by the water of baptism. The ligaments of the body are constituted by Christ, not by blood lines. 2) Single people *remind a family-focused church that while family is a beautiful, sustaining gift, it is not God’s only or primary means of building His body in each generation.* 3) Singles often embody a more radical dependence on God to provide for their earthly needs, since there isn’t a second person to help share the load.

Single Christians face challenges of modern myths about sex and romance, namely, that both are needed in order to live. And while love and relationships are necessary, they can take many different forms. One of the most important things for singles to have in their lives, is deep, sustaining friendships. Single Christians demonstrate that “community and intimacy take many forms and need not be squeezed into the narrow path of erotic love.

The truth that marriage- and with it sexual fulfillment and the possibility of children are not guaranteed. But, what we can count on is that if we follow the risen Lord, we are promised a new life and a new family! And this family will be with us for eternity! So let us begin now, caring for each other as important parts of the same family, by praying for each other, inviting each other to share our lives and by looking to how we can serve the Lord together and build those deep and sustaining friendships. If you have any suggestions as to ways we can help weave singles into our family, please contact me.

Blessed are the merciful for they will receive mercy. Matthew 5:7

How we treat others affects how we will be treated. Jesus indicates this in the Lord's Prayer on forgiving debtors (*Matt 6:12, 14, and 15*), the Golden Rule (*Matt 7:12*), and elsewhere applied to generosity, forgiveness, love, and judging (*Matt. 18:21-35; 25:34-40; Luke 6:36-38*). Jesus promises that by being merciful to others, we will be blessed with mercy.

God is merciful (*Ezekiel 33:11; 1 Tim 2:4; 2 Peter 3:9*), and we are to be merciful as well (*Luke 6:36*). All who have experienced God's mercy through a new life in Christ (*Eph. 2:4-7*) are to be merciful to others. The word comes from two parts of a Latin word meaning "pity" and "of the heart." Our word "sympathy" comes from two Greek words meaning "together" and "to experience or suffer." Mercy is kindness and compassion to the hurting, especially those under one's power. The merciful identify with the miserable in their misery; the more we understand another's experience, the less likely we are to judge harshly. Mercy flows from our heart's reaction to another's distress; it is grace in action, especially when undeserved.

Scripture teaches that we should be reluctant to judge, for the measure we use will be used on us (*Luke 6:37, 38*). When we must judge, do so with mercy, for how we judge others will be applied to us. (*James 2:12, 13*).

Being merciful produces joyful blessings for everyone.

Dearborn, Mich. (February 10, 2014) "We've always done things together," said Eugene Smith, when asked about the secret to his happy marriage with wife Clara and their 71 years of Valentine's Day celebrations. The Smiths' marked their 71st wedding anniversary on January 31, only a few days before Valentine's. Unlike their 50th anniversary celebration which included a trip to China, this year the Dearborn couple shared cake with their friends and neighbors at Oakwood Common. "I made sure we had a two-tiered cake, because my wife ordered two tiers for our wedding day, and the baker only delivered a sheet cake," said Smith. "I'll always remember how disappointed she was, and I want her to be happy."

Sharing her thoughts about their years together, Clara Smith said, "I don't know if there are any secrets to our marriage. It's all about give and take. You try your best to get along together." The couple first met when they were only nine years old and attended the same church in Columbus, Ohio. "It wasn't until I was in the Army and graduated from Officer's Candidate School that I could afford to marry her," said Smith. "It was during World War II, and I was on leave. They opened up the registrar's office on a Saturday so we could get a marriage license."

The Smiths' marriage began the first of many travels the couple made together. Because of Eugene's education and teaching experience in math, the Army sent him to advanced training schools throughout the United States. Clara was able to accompany him on all his assignments except the Philippine Islands where he spent eight months teaching at the United States Armed Forces Institute.

More than 50 years ago, Eugene Smith joined Wayne State University as a professor of math education, and their family settled in a house near Oakwood Hospital. Today, the couple's son Eugene Lynn Smith is an attorney in Dearborn, living nearby. The Smiths also have two grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Having traveled over the years to every continent except Antarctica, the Smiths are now content to stay closer to home and keep busy with a variety of social and fitness activities at Oakwood Common.

Eugene is prepared for Valentine's Day and with a mischievous smile added, "I've already ordered a box of chocolates for Clara, because she is a 'chocoholic'." Clara agreed and never revealed how many boxes of chocolates Eugene has given her over their 71 Valentine's together.

'Forgiveness'

To Forgive: My American Heritage Dictionary shows: to excuse for a fault or offense, to pardon.

An extended meaning is 'to free the offender from the consequences of it; to grant pardon without harboring resentment.' But, "**without harboring resentment**" may be difficult for many of us to do.

On forgiveness, in the New Testament, (JOHN 21. v.15-17), Jesus Christ told Peter, "Feed My Lambs!" This has been interpreted as "nourish, or/tend to those who are young in age, or experience."

There appears to be a strong symmetry between 'LOVE' and 'FORGIVENESS'. Garry Wills writes in 'What Jesus Meant' p. 142, (Love is patient ... kind ... not swollen with self ... does not flare with anger, nor bare a grudge ...) Considering this passage, doesn't that indicate that *'forgiveness is akin to love'*?

It would be difficult to live without, sometimes, satisfying one's grievances and anger. With only one orbit around this life of ours, none of us know how much time we have left. Wouldn't it make sense to settle any known grievances, and to give 'the other person' the benefit of doubt? Amazingly, by taking this action, you are actually helping yourself! Approach God in prayer, asking for His help, in this area of your life.

Forgiveness, then, does not mean that you will automatically and instantly forget the hurts, the wounds inflicted. But, it *can* mean that to live peacefully, and as unfretfully as possible, **a person needs to forgive, and also to receive forgiveness.** In praying, we need to address those cares, and to endeavor to dismiss the troubled feelings. Should we, then, "grant pardon without harboring resentment"? Not always an easy task! But, maybe it is a task on which we all can work?

Max Lucado writes in "Grace for the Moment": Regardless of what you've done, it's not too late ... of how far you've fallen ... it's not too late to let it go, and be free.

Lucado concludes with, **What Makes A Christian A Christian, is not perfection, but forgiveness.'**
