To the good people of First Presbyterian Church of Dearborn

I am grateful and happy to invite you to hear James Kibbie, Chair of the Organ Department of the University of Michigan and myself, your Organist in concert May 03.

This concert showcases this fine instrument, but more importantly our organ is a testament to the faith and vision of those gone before us who helped build this church into what we are today.

Now, as then, our church is part of our contemporary world with all of its opportunities and challenges, and every Sunday for the past 50 years the organ has led the song of this congregation, 'in season and out, in good times and bad', but always to the glory of God, thus empowering us to go forth to serve and share the Good News of salvation.

Our Aeolian Skinner (Op 1427) pipe organ was from the start intended to be exceptional both as a service instrument to lead the song of the people of God and add beauty and variety to the worship service. It was also intended to be a fine concert instrument, capable of playing a variety of literature and able to hold its own with choirs, orchestra and instrument. It was carefully designed and modeled, working with the architect to be integral to our sanctuary and worship service. Marilyn Mason (who played our dedication recital in 1965) one of the world's great concert organists and Chair emerita of the Organ department at U of M has told me often that this is one of her favorite concert instruments, and I must agree. For myself, I've always wanted a concert organ to work with and I have been more than blessed. Beyond this, our organ is a living part of the fabric of this faith community, one thing that we all share as we worship together Sunday after Sunday.

So, I hope to see you at this concert. James Kibbie was one of my teachers at U of M, and Marilyn Mason taught both of us, and so the song rolls on...

On Saturday March 21, members of the single Christian group SOAR piled into a car along with gift bags we had prepared for the homeless on the streets of Detroit. In January, I tasked the members of our group to bring socks for the project we call *Fresh Soles for Fresh Souls*. The socks started coming in right away. We shared the plan at our regular Tuesday dinners, Sunday brunches, Game Night, and through the online groups Dearborn Area Single Christians and Doing the D.

The plan: reuse a plastic bag that the newspaper comes in and attach an encouraging, uplifting Bible verse, add a pair of fresh socks, an apple, and a granola bar.

A variety of volunteers from FPC and SOAR did the attaching, washed and polished the apples, bought the socks and granola bars, stuffed 57 bags, then hit the streets of Detroit to reach out to those homeless who often slip through the cracks.

Exhilarated by the experience, they look forward to repeating the event.

Musings from Pastor Mike, CRE ~ May 2015

Prayer. God has given us a way to communicate with him and him with us. This can be verbal as well as non-verbal, in solitude, pairs, small groups, or in mass. In and through our prayers we express our reverence and adoration of God. We bare our souls in confession. We pour out the thanksgiving of our grateful hearts. We close with our supplications that we ask of him. Theologian R.C. Sproul writes, "Prayer is a means God uses to bring His sovereign will to pass."

Prayer has several necessary ingredients. The first is sincerity. We must pray to God in a way that is not empty, insincere, or deceptive. The second component is reverence. We shouldn't speak to God in a flippant or cavalier manner. The final additive is humility. We must remember that we are sinful and he isn't. He invites us to come boldly before him, but never in an arrogant manner.

Theologian R.C. Sproul also tells us that, "Prayer is to be addressed to God alone, either to God as Triune or to the distinct persons of the Godhead." Nationally known reformed theologian John Piper writes, "Pray to God the Father in the power of God the Spirit, in the name or by the authority and the merit of God the Son. That is the Trinitarian structure mainly of prayer in the Bible." In order to have relationship with the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, we are able to speak to each person of the Trinity based on the different activities they assume. R.C. Sproul writes that "The Father initiates creation and redemption; the Son redeems the creation; and the Holy Spirit regenerates and sanctifies, applying redemption to believers."

The Bible gives us great examples of different types of prayers. Genesis 18:22-33 speaks of **intercession** by Abraham for the city of Sodom. In 1 Kings 3:5-14, Solomon prays for **wisdom**, not for riches or treasures, but for discernment between good and evil. Psalm 22 and later repeated by Jesus on the cross, we experience a prayer of **desperation**, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" requesting God's assistance when all seems hopeless. We also have a prayer of **inquiry** offered up by Saul in Acts 22:10, "What shall I do, Lord?" Finally, there is the often referred to, "perfect prayer" offered up in Matthew 6:9-13 and Luke 11:2-4. This prayer contains it all: **Adoration** ("hallowed be your name"), **Confession** ("forgive us our debts"), **Thanksgiving** ("give us today our daily bread") in which we are acknowledging God as our sustainer and provider, and **Supplication**, ("we also have forgiven our debtors"). The **A.C.T.S.** acrostic helps us to remember the vital elements of prayer.

Prayer. God has given us a way to communicate with him and him with us. We cannot have a relationship with someone we have never had a conversation with. However you organize your week or day, take time to communicate with God as you fit every other activity around it. For many people, scheduling that time with God first-thing in the morning is a way to prevent it from getting squeezed out due to other activities. As my wife Lynn would say, "The vacuuming can wait, the windows will eventually get washed, the cob-webs can will be there tomorrow, but time spent in relationship is non-negotiable." Spend time in relationship with God **EVERY** day!

Finding Strength in the Lord

I don't know about you, but I am finding it more and more difficult to find peace and calm in my daily life. It seems as though everywhere I turn, there is violence, negativity and strife. I long to have a sense of calm and safety....Friends, we can experience that, because **Jesus triumphed over the grave!** Our legacy as Believers is a life in "the Kingdom of God"! Before Jesus was killed, he told his disciples that there would be hardships and difficulty in life. But, if we chose to follow Him, he would save us, and help us triumph over the obstacles that come our way. Don't misunderstand. He did not say we would NOT EXPERIENCE DIFFICULTY. Rather, **when** hardships come (and Believer's experience them just like everyone else), IF we put our trust and faith in Jesus, He will help us in practical and tangible ways. Instead of a life of chaos and the unknown, we can trust in Him to guide us into all truth. And this is so, because after his death and resurrection, He ascended to the Father, who knows all things. He then sent the Spirit of Jesus to live within us! And why does that even make a difference you might ask? It matters because, in the book of John, Jesus foretold the difference it would make if he left the disciples and returned to heaven. He said, "In that day you will no longer ask **me** anything. Very truly I tell you, my Father will give **you** whatever you ask in my **Name**. Until now you have not asked for anything in my name. Ask and you will receive, and your joy will be complete...."(John 16:23-24). You see, we don't celebrate Easter because of the "idea" that Jesus was crucified, died and was raised. We celebrate because it **did happen!** And because He triumphed over death, we can live in the assurance that whatever comes our way (or befalls us), the Spirit (of Jesus) will be there to walk beside us, comfort us....and grant us peace. He spoke these words to his disciple's right before his death, and I believe they can comfort us today: "But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and will remind you of everything I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid" (John 14: 26-28). Remember: **prayer** is the vehicle of God's presence, and we are told to come boldly before Him and ask for what we need. And when you do, my prayer is that you sense His presence and receive an answer to your need.

Love one another even as I have loved you. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.
(John 13:34, 35) RSV

Here Jesus teaches that churches should be seen by outsiders as gatherings where disciples really love each other and outsiders would be welcomed. Since Christianity is about holy love, and love fulfills the law (*Rom. 13:10*), Jesus invites the world to use this standard of love to identify Jesus' genuine disciples. Hostility within church is awful!

Disciples are to love each other as Jesus loves us. His love is unconditional, by grace, not merit. His love is sacrificial, forgiving wrongs without penalty (*Rom. 12:21*), and generous. Jesus' love is pure, not manipulative. He gave His life for those He loves (you and I, *John 15:13*). As Jesus displayed God's love, disciples are to display Jesus' love. This love also includes our love for God and neighbor (*Matt. 22:37-40*). Francis Schaeffer taught that love is the essential, distinctive mark of a disciple. This love is unconditional and commits to the best interests of others.

How can we love like this? First, we need to be transformed (*John 3:3-7*) with God's help. Then, *Colossians 3:1 - 17* teaches what we should do and not do to help us love. *Luke 15:11 – 32* provides an excellent example. Outsiders who see real love in action are likely to find the Gospel attractive.

Now faith, hope, and love abide, but the greatest of these is love (*1 Cor. 13:13; 1 John 3:14*)

“Darkness enveloped the whole American armada. Not a pinpoint of light showed from those hundreds of ships as they surged on through the night toward their destiny, carrying across the ageless and indifferent sea tens of thousands of young men, fighting for ... for, well, at least each other.”

Journalist Ernie Pyle wrote these words in 1944 to describe the beginning of the Normandy invasion [during World War II]. For Americans, these words paint a picture of the fear and confusion surrounding soldiers on the eve of battle... [these words] also impart the sense of determination those young men must have felt. Through his words, Ernie Pyle puts us in touch with our patriotism, our pride and our understanding of who we are and how we came to be a nation....

... As we remember [our] comrades in arms this Memorial Day, we must look to the future as well as the past. In today's world, freedom comes cloaked in uncertainty. America still relies on her sons and daughters to defend her liberty. The cost of independence is high, but we are willing to pay it. We do not pay it gladly, but we pay it with deep reverence and thanks to those who have sacrificed their lives for America. We know that in the years to come, more brave souls will sacrifice their lives for our nation. We include them in our thoughts and prayers today.”
