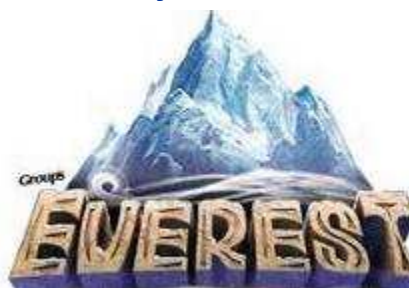

The Day of Pentecost had three emphases: The birthday of the Christian Church, the celebration of the heritage of the Presbyterian Church in the USA, and our secular recognition of those who gave their lives for our freedom, Memorial Day. Truly a day of thanksgiving.

May 31st is the time in which Christians recognize an important theological decision by our forebears – the Doctrine of the Trinity. Here at First Church we are so aware of this doctrine as we find it symbolized in every feature of our Church building. From the triangular shape of the Sanctuary, Mitchell Hall, and the Chapel to the mighty cement pillars we are encouraged to lift our hearts and spirits to glorify God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Good News: It is certainly a joy to announce a significant gift to our Endowment fund from the estate of Edwin and Alice Hardy. Many of you, as I, remember their active participation in the life of our church while Ed was employed for 28 years at the Ford Motor Company. Their gift of \$210,000 has been received and the Session is currently considering the disposition. A portion of the gift has been set aside, at the request of their children, to establish an Edwin and Alice Hardy Christian Education Fund with the interest each year to be used by our CE Committee.

June begins for Dot and I with a celebration of our 62nd wedding Anniversary on June 1st. Following worship on June 7th our Peru Team will have a concluding fund raising event with a hot dog lunch. Our "Man Day celebration" is held on Sunday, June 21st – The church notes this as "Men of the Church Sunday," while families recognize it as Father's Day. (I KNOW, every day is Children's day.)

June 28th is a time of special recognition of the **Celtic Cross** – We have three Hand carved crosses at First Church. The large central cross in the Sanctuary in memory of H.W. McKenzie (trustee of FPCD, husband of elder Mary McKenzie, father of Mary Jane and Katherine McKenzie); the cross in the Chapel dedicated to the memory of 1st Lt. Tom Gentinne, who lost his life during the war in Vietnam; and the cross in the Memorial Garden in memory of Jack (Ruth) Sluiter whose dedication to our facility made many of the features we enjoy possible. 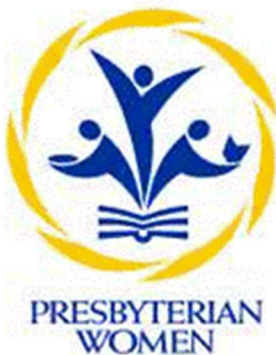
History of our Celtic Crosses

I remember how loving and caring Ed Beers was for his wife Jan. I remember stories of him as a teacher. I was touched by how proud he was of his nieces and nephews. He was like a second father to them. It was nice to see how much they cared for him.

I remember Bud Reid. Someone said that he might be a bit distant of pastors. It was quite the opposite. He told me many stories about the auto union and his relationships with the key leaders. He told me about how his uncle who died in WWII was his hero. His dad was a hard man to please, yet Bud would tell me how proud he was of his children. He at times felt bad for all the work his wife Charlene had to do to take of him. He shared how fortunate he was to have her. If you mentioned his granddaughter Evelyn, it always brought a smile to his face, even when he was in pain. He told me how he prayed every day for his family and a number of others (including me).

Betty Stacy often told me how much she loved this church. She shared how a number of our members were there for her when her husband died and the difference that it made. She shared about her family and how blessed she was. She was so proud of her son Don. She more than once called me up to see if there were any special unmet needs that she could help with for the church. She especially liked helping us get video projectors and wanted to help with the sound system. She had painful arthritis so at times she would ask me to pray for a less painful Sunday morning so she could get to the church. She was not into complaining, she was into being thankful.

Bob Szczechura was a gentle man. He seemed to always be thinking of others. He was an effective Bible teacher. He loved his wife Tracie deeply and worked hard at being there for his children. He worried and prayed for them over times of separation, for their choices, for their health, for their jobs, for their future. Things did not always go his way, but it did not keep him from seeking to be there for those he cared about. It did not keep him from seeking God's way and as he sought God, God found a place for him in His Home.

We need to remember that God has a place for those who love Him and that we can be reunited in heaven as we trust in His love.

Musings from Pastor Mike, CRE



The magnificent temple of Apollo, located in Didyma, Turkey was built by the Greeks during ancient times. While not mentioned specifically in the Bible, we are sure that Paul visited the area and could have sent disciples that he made to this area of Asia Minor as well. This temple to Apollo was magnificent. It was a temple within a temple, held up by 122, six-story columns. Each column took 57 years to carve, and the entire temple took 820 years to build.

It was at this temple that people would travel to ask the god Apollo the answer to a question that they had. The priest, or *oracle* would take the question to a sage who would, in a drug-induced stupor, prophesy the answer from Apollo. It was a laborious, time-consuming ritual that we will cover this summer in the Adult Sunday school Class, so be sure to plan on attending! Basically, an old, high-on-drugs woman would tell you what her god told her which would in turn, answer your question...kind of like the folks working in the information/first aid tent at the Woodstock Music Festival did back in the early 1970s!

Jesus disciples and their disciples were deeply committed to learning, living, teaching, and praying the Hebrew Scripture – the Word of the Living God. They sought to obey the texts as Rabbi Jesus interpreted it, taught it, and demonstrated it every day of his life. So how could the disciples make disciples among Hellenistic people who knew little, if anything about the Word of God? It seems that all people are searching for meaning and purpose in life. But there is a right way and a dead-end way to accomplish this.

Leviticus 19:31 states, “Do not turn to mediums or seek out spiritualists, for you will be defiled by them. I am the Lord your God.” Isaiah 55:10-11 writes. “As the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return it without watering the earth and making it bud and flourish, so that it yields seeds for the sower and bread for the eater, so is the word that goes out from my mouth: it will not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it.”

You see, we don’t need fortune tellers, dice, cards, Horoscopes, fortune cookies, Magic Eight Balls, or Ouiji Boards to give us the answers to questions that we are searching for. We have all our answers in one, handy book! The Bible is our reference for any question that we have. While it is true that there are some areas that seem not to be boldly black and white, many gifted theologians have spent their lives writing Bible commentaries that can be poured through and compared as we pray to the Holy Spirit for His discernment.

“Your word is a lamp for my feet, a light on my path.” –Psalm 119:105.

Take time for daily Bible reading EACH DAY! – God’s Peace.

What Dads Leave Behind

A clipping from a Dutch magazine a number of years ago described a child's attitude toward his father as the years pass by. At age 4, the child says, "My daddy can do anything." At age 7, "My daddy knows a lot. A whole lot." At age 8 he says, "Well my father doesn't quite know everything." At 12 he says, "Naturally, my father doesn't know that either." At 14, "My dad is so hopelessly old-fashioned." Age 21, "That man is so out of date." At 25 years, "Dad knows a little, but not too much." At 30 years, "I must find out what Dad thinks about this." At 35 years, "Before we decide, let's get Dad's idea first." At 50, "What would Dad have thought about that?" At 60 years, "My Dad knew literally everything." At 65 years he says, "I wish I could talk it over with Dad one more time."

How important good and godly dads are. The father who faithfully stands beside his wife and children is becoming more and more of a rarity in our society. I believe America needs dads more than ever because of what we are facing today. While the Marine Corps slogan is, "Looking for a few good men," I think our country's new slogan ought to be: "Looking for a few godly men."

A few years ago, *L.A. Times Magazine* ran an article about the invisible dad. It pointed out, "Many American men are disconnecting from family life and society is paying the price. Consider two of the nation's most serious problems: crime and teenage pregnancy. Studies show that the most reliable predictor of these behaviors is not income. It's not race. It's family structure. Pregnant girls and criminal boys tend to come from fatherless families. An astonishing 70 percent of imprisoned minors have spent at least part of their lives without fathers."

This article went on to quote Father Gregory Boyle, a priest in East Los Angeles. He once wrote down the names of 100 gang members whom he knew personally, and next to their names, he wrote down their family history. He was shocked to realize that all but five on the list were not currently living with their biological fathers, if they ever had.

Fathers are so important because they are a visible link between their children and the Father in Heaven. Many of the attitudes children will develop toward God will be connected to the ones they have toward their fathers. The potential impact of a good and godly father is immeasurable. Don't believe it when people say children don't need a mom and a dad. They need both as much as possible.

Certainly, many pressures come with fatherhood. Some of us feel ill-equipped. But it's better to be a learning dad than an absent one.

A father's influence will not only impact his children, it will impact his grandchildren, his great-grandchildren, and his great-great-grandchildren. The values fathers pass on to their children today, whether sinful or godly, will be passed on to their children in the future.

Consider the impact of the life of one godly man, Jonathan Edwards. A great preacher in American history who lived at a time of great spiritual awakening, he was renowned for his message, "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God." In addition to being a pastor, he was the President of Princeton University, an author, and the father of 11 children.

Of Jonathan Edwards' known male descendants, more than 300 became pastors, missionaries, or theological professors. Another 120 descendants became college professors, 110 became attorneys, 60 were prominent authors, 30 became judges, and 14 served as presidents of universities or colleges. Three descendants served in the U. S. Congress, and one became the Vice President of the United States.

A very busy man who reputedly spent 13 hours each day in study, Jonathan Edwards still made a habit of spending an hour at home with his children every day. He took time to be with them, and what a legacy he left!

As C. H. Spurgeon said, "A good character is the best tombstone. Those who love you and were helped by you will remember you. So carve your name on hearts and not on marble."

If you're a father, are you carving your name on the hearts of your children right now? Are you leaving a godly legacy of good character? It's the greatest thing you can leave.

Weeping may tarry for the night, but joy comes in the morning
Psalm 30:5b (RSV)

Have you felt the despair of intense sorrow? How can one get beyond such pain? What are we to believe?

Joseph was sold into slavery; God used him to preserve Israel (*Gen. 50:20*). Jesus' crucifixion was horrible; the unexpected Resurrection turned the disciples sorrow into joy (*John 16:20*). Paul taught that God uses "everything" to conform us into Christ's image (*Rom. 8:28-30*).

James tells us to face trials with joy as they produce steadfastness, helping us mature (*James 1:2-8*). God's comforting us equips us for ministry (*Rom. 5:3-5*) so we can comfort others (*2 Cor. 1:2-4*).

Jesus told us to face tribulation with good cheer for He has overcome the world (*John 16:33*). Paul tells us that Christians will suffer (*2 Tim. 3:12*); Paul learned to be content despite circumstances (*Phil. 4:4-7, 11-13*) by always rejoicing in Christ and relying upon Him. Paul considered his present sufferings to be trivial compared with the glory to be revealed in us (*Rom. 8:18*). Joy often follows sorrow.

One day, we will rejoice when presented without blemish into God's presence (*Jude 24*). This contrasts with Isaiah's fearful experience facing God before his sin was removed (*Isaiah 6:5*). Isaiah cried out "woe is me"; we will rejoice (*Rev. 21:1-4*).

Psalm 30:5 starts with: "**For His anger is but for a moment, and His favor is for a lifetime.**" Under God, sorrows are temporary but His love is eternal (like a Father). Therefore, each day is a day which the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it (*Psalm 118:24*).

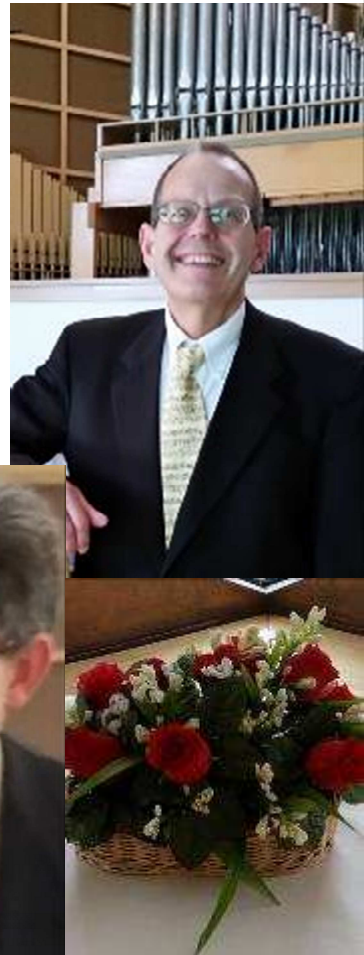
