July is Anti-Boredom Month

Welcome to summer everyone! I hope that all of you have some fun activities planned with family and friends over the next few months. Here are a few suggestions to help during the times that you or your children run out of ideas of "things to do".

Biking or hiking on a bike trail.

TrailLink.com, a website powered by Rails to Trails, a national nonprofit that's working to transform abandoned railroads into bike paths. According to the site, there are more than 30,000 trails across the country that are suitable for bike riding, walking, riding a horse, jogging -- anything but driving.

Gardening. While this is easier said than done, especially if you're not a gardener yourself, it can be done fairly inexpensively. Separate out a small plot in a bigger garden and give your children their own plot. It should be their responsibility to water, weed and harvest.

Open a lemonade stand. It's fun and educational at the same time, and if you really want to go all out and do something a little different and teach your kids about service and helping a good cause (raising money for cancer research) check out Alex's Lemonade, a nonprofit website that teaches kids how to put up their own lemonade stand. Basically, you register online, and the site sends you a lemonade stand kit, which includes promotional materials, tips for holding a successful lemonade stand and, while supplies last, a voucher for a canister of lemonade. (www.alexslemonade.org)

Volunteering. The nonprofit WaysToHelp.org lists thousands of volunteer opportunities for children and teenagers. To find something your kids will enjoy, you can use its search engine to find volunteer activities that children and

teenagers are allowed to participate in. Ask your children which activities sound interesting -- they're more likely to enjoy it if they get to choose themselves. (Note that some of the options will not be suitable for children)

Bowling. It's usually an inexpensive activity, anyway, but if you go to KidsBowlFree.com, you can print free bowling coupons throughout the summer that are good at bowling alleys across the country.

Fishing. While there doesn't seem to be a kids-fish-free website out there, numerous state and county parks will often teach kids how to fish for free. And there are many free fishing activities out there. Just Google your location and the words "fishing" and "free," and see what you get. Regardless, with a lot of kids' fishing poles retailing for under \$15, this can be a pretty cheap sport.

Finally, remember this summer that there is value in your kids doing nothing. It might sound crazy or lazy at first, but Dr. Susan Smith Kuczmarski, Ed.D., who is based in Chicago and often conducts workshops for parents and educators, and "There's tremendous value for children in what I call 'hammock time.' This means doing nothing: daydreaming, hanging out, getting lost in your thoughts, doodling. Call it what you will, it means shifting gears to neutral. Our culture puts so much emphasis on 'doing,' and children soon pick that up. Children are profoundly nourished by introspective time. Too much focus on busy activities and games leaves very little time to dream, wonder, reflect and discover."

This Month's Reflection on the Word

I do believe, help me overcome my unbelief. Mark 9:24

The subject is doubt. The context is a father whose son was possessed by an evil spirit. The father said he believed that Jesus could help his son, yet he still struggled with unbelief. Jesus blessed him despite his doubt.

Doubt is not the opposite of faith. Doubt is between belief and unbelief – holding both in tension. Some churches and religions condemn doubt, but God loves authentic doubters. Authentic doubters seek the truth and do not accept easy answers. When told of Jesus' Resurrection, "Doubting" Thomas refused to believe until he could check it out (*John 20:25*). Jesus gave him evidence and he believed. Authentic doubters examine the evidence, analyze the reasons, and ask disciples why they believe (*1 Peter 3:15*). This strengthens faith.

Foggy doubt is quite different. Here, the doubter raises issues not to seek truth but to

rationalize unbelief. The foggy doubter might say such things as, "How can I believe in a God who tolerates evil, poverty, war, sickness, injustice, etc." or "Hasn't science disproved God?" or "many Christians are hypocritical" or "I am not sure about the Resurrection." The foggy doubter does not try to understand these issues – instead he uses them to rationalize unbelief and thus excuse himself from taking Christ seriously. As a result, he becomes unstable and double minded, receiving little from the Lord (*James 1:6-8*). Belief is a moral choice; unbelief is sin (*Romans 1:19-21*).

Doubt is an important stage on the road to faith. To deal with doubt, we need to ask God's help, seek to understand God better (*Rom. 11:33*), ask questions, and study the evidence for the faith. Also pray because the Holy Spirit helps us understand and believe (*1 Cor. 2:1-14; John 16:8, 9*).

Does doubt limit your faith? If so, seek the Truth. Knowing the Truth sets you free (*John 8:32*).

1941

In June, Marilyn Netting, (the lady who would become my wife in eight years) and I graduated from Southeastern High School in Detroit where we had been friends, neighbors and classmates for the previous six years, without the slightest indication such an event could possibly happen, since we had yet to have our first date. This was abruptly corrected the following month when I took her to Eastwood Gardens, where we danced with thousands of others outdoors under the stars to the music of the great Glenn Miller and his band of renown. In mid-September, I began my college career as a

freshman at Michigan State, and the following Saturday took her to the first of what would be an annual experience, repeated countless times thereafter, to witness the annual 'gridiron fracas' between the Spartans and the Wolverines... an event she dearly looked forward to. Then we celebrated our 18th birthdays, hers on the 29th and mine five days later on October 4th. Imagine, I was married to an older woman. Sixty-four days later, our lives were violently upset with the eruption of World War II on December 07, with the surprise Japanese bombing attack on the U.S. Naval base at Pearl Harbor in the Hawaiian Islands. This sequence of events occurred 70 years ago.



Mission Sewing is a ministry of Presbyterian Women. This ministry provides clothing, linens, school supplies, baby layettes, and many other similar articles for hospitals, charities, overseas charities, nursing homes and shelters, which in turn give them to the needy. When it was first instituted, the articles were mostly sewn by the ladies who made up Presbyterian Women. Today most of the articles provided are purchased mainly because there simply are not enough sewers with the time needed to complete the needed articles. Also the needs extend beyond those items that can be sewn at home or at the church. So each year at about this time we ask our congregation for donations of items which the Presbytery committee tells us are

needed by the various charities they will work with that year. This list is available in the church narthex until the end of August. Please stop by our table and pick up a card with the item(s) which you may wish to donate. The items may be brought to the church any time until September 24. You may wish to partner up with another person for the more expensive items. Last March our church sewers hemmed 27 baby blankets. Some of the women have knitted baby hats, preemie blankets, and booties. But many other items are needed. Please help.
