



Reflections on the Recent Actions of the PCUSA General Assembly (GA) in Detroit





Mason and Dixon were out surveying and arguing, when Mason said to Dixon, "You've got to draw the line somewhere." Our recent GA actions went beyond the line of Scripture. It voted to allow Churches and Pastors in states where Same Sex Unions are legal to be able to perform such unions. We are a confessing Church, which means that the Session is on record as declaring that such unions are not Biblical, so even if legal in Michigan, they will not be performed here. As a Pastor, I remain obedient to Scripture & will never do such a ceremony. The GA also sent a change in the constitution to be ratified by the presbyteries redefining marriage as between two persons. If the presbyteries approve, the PCUSA worship book will be changed to reflect this. Whatever the PCUSA votes it will not change my stand; I would resign my ordination in the PCUSA before I would violate God's Word. The Word of God shall stand forever.

In the Great Commission in Matthew 28, we are charged to obey all that Christ commands us to do. The Greek word includes the sense of guarding or holding dear God's Word. Recently an extended family member asked me if I would do a wedding for their lesbian daughter if she would want to marry another woman. I told her I would continue to love her daughter but would not do the wedding ceremony. Part of what all that Christ commands is for us to love one another. If I was asked to do a same sex marriage, I would still love the people, but not do the wedding. In fact, I would not do the wedding because I do love the people and I know that what God wants and commands is what is best for them.

In regard to divestiture of the three companies working in Israel, I understand why the GA took the action it did, but it was not done in a loving way or even a rational way. It was power politics. While much of Israel's actions toward the Palestinians are wrong, the same case could be made for much if not most of the Middle East and the third world. The action of the GA was selective justice, which in itself is wrong. It is ironic that the actions are taken against an ally of the US, which could suggest that it is safer to be an enemy of the US. I would not comment on this normally because I believe that politics do not belong in the church, I only wish the GA did.

Music Corner

It's July! What happened to the first half of the year?! Not too much to report on our music ministries. The choir is off for the summer, but we still have special music opportunities and great music on Sundays from our Praise Band and Organ! If you're interested in presenting a special music over the summer, please see me.

Since I have some room to share this month, I thought I would talk about the writing of a favorite hymn, "Exceedingly Great and Precious Promises."

"Exceedingly Great and Precious Promises" first appeared in *A Selection of Hymns from the Best Authors, Intended to Be an Appendix to Dr. Watts' Psalms and Hymns*, published in 1787. This collection was edited by John Rippon, pastor at Carter's Lane Baptist Church, and his Minister of Music, Robert Keene.

The author for the text of the hymn is anonymous, in the publication, in the author's line is only the letter "K." Many scholars have postulated that the author is Robert Keene, but this has not been confirmed.

The unique power of this hymn is due to the fact that each of the seven original stanzas were based on various biblical promises. The first verse established the hymnist's theme – God's word is a sufficient foundation for our faith. The author then selected precious promises from the Bible, and converted these into hymn stanzas, among them:

Isaiah 41:10 – Fear not, for I am with you: be not dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you, yes, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand.

Isaiah 43:2 – When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overflow you. When you walk through the fire, you shall not be burned, nor shall the flame scorch you.

2 Corinthians 12:9 – My grace is sufficient for you, for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Therefore most gladly I will rather boast in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me.

Hebrews 13:5 – For He Himself has said, "I will never leave you nor forsake you."

(from *Then Sings My Soul: 150 of the World's Greatest Hymn Stories*, Robert J. Morgan, 2003)

Today we know this hymn as "How Firm a Foundation" and we normally sing it to the tune PROTECTION (or later FOUNDATION due to its association with this hymn). The tune first appeared in Joseph Funk's *A Compilation of Genuine Church Music*, published in 1832. It is possible that the words were originally sung to Robert Keene's tune GEARD.

Hopefully this will give us new insight into one of the great hymns of the faith. ~In Christ, Marshall

Musings from Pastor Mike - July 2014

Lay Pastor Report: As the FPC Lay Pastor, I am blessed to be able to share a message when Pastor Dave is out of town, as well as for the *Saturday Night Alive* Praise afternoons. Most recently I was able to present a sermon on Pentecost Sunday in which I spoke about overflowing with God's Holy Spirit in order to make a difference in the world. We learned about how to leave behind dull religion, experience super-natural power, and become a part of God's miracle in which he moves through us individually and as a church, in order to multiply our potential. GrouPeru!'14 Coordinator: Praise God, as this Vision goes to press we will be arriving home from our two-week International Mission Trip which is based on a relational 15 year commitment that this church has made to the rescued street-boys of Peru. A huge thank-you to David Carlson, Elissa and Jared Hoffman, newbies: Grace and Kim Doverspike, Natalie Husby, Steven Stormzand, a returning participant from N.C., Sarah Pinsonault, and a special thank-you to my wife who keeps impeccable records of each individual's financial accounts, as well as planning out and buying the food for all the fund-raisers. It has been encouraging that so many of you have remarked that besides being able to show your support for each year's team, you also relish the opportunity to socialize with your church family over a delicious, monthly meal. The 10 of us will report on July 13th as we plan-out and participate in the Peru worship service.

Young Adult Ministries Director: The many components of this ministry is what keeps me busiest, challenges me most, and is so rewarding! The mentoring ministry has paired 10 adults with 13 young adults and has helped both to transform in so many ways. The landscaping ministry has helped develop gardening skills in young adults and this year has involved Bryce Norwood, Jared Hoffman, and Don Stanfill, as well as occasionally other young adults. I am blessed to be able to share my passion as a certified Advance Master Gardener with these young men and women as well as am able to play in the soil a few months each year. Converge Christian Community is running well at Panera Cares each Saturday as we continue to hone in on a select group of young adults who desire to grow as Servant Leaders and Disciples, entering the mission field to be the hands and feet of Jesus. In just 6 months, we have completed over 25 mission projects as well as have many more planned. Jonathan and I are already looking ahead toward next year, exploring a formal discipleship program called 3DM for possible implementation. Pray that God continues to multiply all of our efforts to reach out to those who desire to transform in Christ, bring about His Kingdom, and give God all the glory.

What is Sleep Apnea?

According to the American Sleep Apnea Association, sleep disorders, including sleep apnea, have become a significant health issue in the United States. It is estimated that 22 million Americans suffer from sleep apnea, with 80 percent of the cases of moderate and severe obstructive sleep apnea (OSA) undiagnosed. OSA, which represents the great preponderance of the cases when left untreated can lead to high blood pressure, chronic heart failure, atrial fibrillation, stroke, and other cardiovascular problems; it is associated with type 2 diabetes and depression; and is a factor in many traffic accidents and accidents with heavy machinery, owing to the persistent drowsiness suffered by many OSA patients before the disease is recognized and treated. The public and the health community are generally aware of the increasing obesity of Americans, a phenomenon related to the increase in sleep apnea. *Few outside the sleep medicine community, however, are aware that too little good sleep appears to be as much a factor in obesity as too much food and too little exercise.*

Unless our bed partner is disrupting our sleep, most of us don't think of snoring as something to be overly concerned about. But frequent, loud snoring may be a sign of sleep apnea, a common and potentially serious disorder in which breathing repeatedly stops and starts as you sleep. Although sleep apnea is treatable, it often goes unrecognized. Learning how to identify the warning signs, how to distinguish it from normal snoring, is the first step to overcoming sleep apnea and getting a good night's sleep.

Sleep apnea affects the way you breathe when you're sleeping. In untreated sleep apnea, breathing is briefly interrupted or becomes very shallow during sleep. These breathing pauses typically last between 10 to 20 seconds and can occur up to hundreds of times a night, jolting you out of your natural sleep rhythm. As a consequence, you spend more time in light sleep and less time in the deep, restorative sleep you need to be energetic, mentally sharp, and productive the next day.

There are 3 Types of Sleep Apnea

Obstructive sleep apnea is the most common type of sleep apnea. It occurs when the soft tissue in the back of your throat relaxes during sleep and blocks the airway, often causing you to snore loudly.

Central sleep apnea is a much less common type of sleep apnea that involves the central nervous system, occurring when the brain fails to signal the muscles that control breathing. People with central sleep apnea seldom snore.

Complex sleep apnea is a combination of obstructive sleep apnea and central sleep apnea.

"Anatomy of a Sleep Apnea Episode"

As airflow stops during a sleep apnea episode, the oxygen level in your blood drops. Your brain responds by briefly disturbing your sleep enough to kick start breathing—which often resumes with a gasp or a choking sound. If you have obstructive sleep apnea, you probably won't remember these awakenings. Most of the time, you'll stir just enough to tighten your throat muscles and open your windpipe. In central sleep apnea, you may be conscious of your awakenings.

Sleep apnea signs and symptoms

It can be tough to identify sleep apnea on your own, since the most prominent symptoms only occur when you're asleep. But you can get around this difficulty by asking a bed partner to observe your sleep habits, or by recording yourself during sleep.

Major Signs of Sleep Apnea:

- If pauses occur while you snore, and if choking or gasping follow the pauses, these are major signs that you have sleep apnea.
- Another common sign of sleep apnea is fighting sleepiness during the day, at work, or while driving. You may find yourself rapidly falling asleep during the quiet moments of the day when you're not active. Even if you don't have daytime sleepiness, talk with your doctor if you have problems breathing during sleep.

Other Common Signs and Symptoms of Sleep Apnea:

Morning headaches

Memory or learning problems and not being able to concentrate

Feeling irritable, depressed, or having mood swings or personality changes

Waking up frequently to urinate

Dry mouth or sore throat when you wake up

Do You Have Sleep Apnea? (simple quiz. Not intended to replace professional diagnosis)

- Do you snore more than three nights a week? Yes (2 points) No
2. Is your snoring loud (can it be heard through a door or wall)? Yes (2 points) No
3. Has anyone ever told you that you briefly stop breathing or gasp when you are asleep? Never
 Occasionally (2 points) Frequently (5 points)
4. What is your collar size? Less than 17 inches (16 women) Greater than 17 inches (16 women) (5 points)
5. Have you had high blood pressure, or are you being treated for it? Yes (2 points)
6. Do you ever doze or fall asleep during the day when you are not busy or active? Yes (2 points)
7. Do you ever doze or fall asleep during the day when you are driving or stopped at a light? Yes (2 points)

Total Score: 0-5 Low Probability of sleep apnea 6-8 Uncertain, but if any symptoms, discuss with physician 9+ You may have sleep apnea and are a good candidate for a sleep study. See your doctor immediately.

So, Is it Just Snoring or Sleep Apnea? Not everyone who snores has sleep apnea, and not everyone who has sleep apnea snores. So how do you tell the difference between normal snoring and a more serious case of sleep apnea?

The biggest telltale sign is how you feel during the day. Normal snoring doesn't interfere with the quality of your sleep as much as sleep apnea does, so you're less likely to suffer from extreme fatigue and sleepiness during the day.

So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift.

Matthew 5:23, 24

Worship and reconciliation are very important. Here Jesus teaches that worship is incomplete without reconciliation. Jesus had just taught on the serious dangers of anger (*Matt. 5:21, 22*). How we relate to each other affects our communion with God. Disputes that persist within the family of God weaken the church.

Jesus gave us four steps to heal our personal disputes: If a church member sins against you, go directly and privately to him and point out the fault. If the member listens to you, forgive and be reconciled! But if you are not listened to, go back to the member again with one or two others with you so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses (see: *2 Cor. 13:1; 1 Tim. 5:19; Deut. 19:15*). If the offender still refuses to listen, take it to church leadership; (*Matt. 18:15-17*), and if the offender refuses to listen even then, church leadership may consider discipline and/or exclusion (*1 Cor. 5:5*). Keep disputes within the church -- Christians disputing before outsiders undermines Christ's mission (*John 13:34, 35; 1 Cor. 6:1-8*). Try to avoid legal action.

How do such disputes arise? James 4:1-2 tells us that fights and quarrels come from our passion over frustrated ungodly desires. Some also come from misunderstandings and some from spiritual immaturity. Loving confrontation and forgiveness can help angry people find peace and repent.

"Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you" (*Col. 3:13*). Our purpose is to restore, not remove.
