4:12 – Youth Group Update: Knowing Jesus, Lord of the Sabbath



The first part of Jesus' ministry was filled with conflict with the Pharisees. One of these confrontations was on the Sabbath when Jesus' disciples were picking heads of grain to eat. Although this was not against the Law of Moses, it did break the manmade restrictions set up by the Pharisees. In Mark 2:23-28, Jesus declares that, "The Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath. So the Son of Man is Lord even of the Sabbath." What does this mean for us today?

"The Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath." God designed us to function properly and joyfully in dependence on Him. Therefore, in his laws for Israel, he included time to stop working and trust God for provision. This helped the people to rely on God instead of striving to be self-sufficient by working seven days a week. This especially took faith during harvest time, when the crops could be lost if they were not harvested quickly. The Sabbath, and for that matter all of God's commands, were not arbitrary rules to follow! They are here for our sake, so we can live full, godly, joyful lives.

Are you reaping the full benefits of resting with God? We don't worship on Saturday (Sabbat) like the Jews did, but we do have a day set aside for worship. In the midst of your career, homework, taxiing the kids to activities, or even church activities... are you pausing to enjoy the Sabbath rest that God has for you? Jesus is the Lord of the Sabbath, and desires to give you greater joy as you make time for him in your busy schedule each day and week. He loves you. I encourage you to spend some time talking and listening to him this week. And yes, it's ok to stop for a snack along the way.

Praise God! There are many favorite parts of my **Young Adult Ministry**. Converge Community in Christ of course is the “core” of the ministry, but did you also know that there are a number of “satellite” Young Adult Ministries that take place on other days of the week?

Converge Landscaping – This is one of my “babies”. Many of you know that I ran a landscaping business for 15 years during my teaching career that kept many in my youth group busy. Now that I work with young adults, we have teamed up to do everything from weeding to full-yard make-overs for members of FPC-D. Don Stanfill, Jonathan Mallard, and Justin Grajek have been my crew members and I thank God for their muscles and stamina... and Rite-Aid for Bengay!

Huddles and Soccer Teams – Jonathan & I have been blessed by the teaching and organizational skills of Dave Carlson (not our own, David Carlson) from Woodside Church in Troy. Dave has formed a “huddle” with Jonathan, myself, and 2 other guys. Each week we learn, practice, and keep each other accountable, utilizing the nuts and bolts of discipleship. I am a relatively new-comer to the huddle, so Dave is meeting with me on another day each week to help bring me up to speed. The other 3 guys have “multiplied” and have started their own huddles (I plan to do this shortly at FPC-D). Dave and I are also working on sharing the gospel on college campuses in a succinct, lay-back way, utilizing an app on our cell phone. Jonathan is a captain of a soccer team (appropriately called “The Trouble-Makers” J) which utilizes a relational way of inviting key leaders into a huddle. All of these ministries focus on evangelism.

U of M- D Lunch Meet-ups – Since Jonathan is pursuing a business degree at the U of M-D, he is utilizing his lunch times twice a week to meet-up individually with members of Converge to chat about anything and everything.

Friday “English Speaking Only” Outings – I got this ministry going with the international students who want extra practice using their English while visiting nearby landmarks. We have visited the Henry Ford, had a cook-out in our back-yard, parked for Homecoming, visited a number of coffee shops, ate in Mexican town, had ice cream at Calder’s Dairy, been to Apple Charley’s, walked the River Walk (see below), gone laser tagging, and cleaned-up Detroit.

Music Corner

Thanksgiving. If you're like me, you start thinking about what music goes with the holiday. Unlike Christmas, for which there seems to be unending music, Thanksgiving has a much smaller selection. Two of my favorites are "Now Thank We All Our God" set to the Johann Crüger Chorale NUN DANKE or NUN DANKE ALLE GOTT and harmonized by Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy, and "Come, Ye Thankful People, Come" set to Sir George J. Elvey's tune ST. GEORGE'S, WINDSOR.

I didn't know all that much about "Come, Ye Thankful People, Come" so I started doing some digging. The text was written in 1844 by Henry Alford, then Rector of the Aston Stanford church in Buckinghamshire, England. The poem originally had 7 verses, and appeared "Hymns and Psalms" the same year under the title "After Harvest". In 1865 the poem was revised by Alford for publication in his book "Poetical Works." By this time it was being sung to the tune as we know it, ST. GEORGE'S, WINDSOR by George Elvey.

Henry Alford was born in London in 1810. He was a renowned scholar and preacher. Aside from his pastoral duties at Aston Stanford, he lectured at Trinity College, Cambridge, and later in life was the Dean of Canterbury Cathedral.

George Elvey was born in Canterbury, England, where his family had been involved in the musical life of the cathedral and city for generations. At the age of 14 he was appointed organist at New College, Oxford. He obtained his Bachelor in Music from New College and went on to study at the Royal Academy of Music.

In 1835 was appointed organist at St. George's Chapel, Windsor. This royal chapel, on the grounds of Windsor Castle, placed him in close contact with the royal family. Elvey was much admired by the royal family, and one of his principal patrons was Albert, Prince Consort to Queen Victoria. Elvey wrote two funeral anthems in memory of the Prince Consort on his passing in 1861. He also was music teacher to some of the younger members of the extended royal family.

The tune ST. GEORGE'S, WINDSOR was composed in 1856 as a setting for James Montgomery's text "Hark! The Song of Jubilee." In 1861 the tune was associated with "Now Thank We All Our God" in the publication "Hymns Ancient and Modern." Since then, the text and tune have gone together.

An English hymn, many of the hymns in "Hymns Ancient and Modern" (the hymnal for the Church of England for many years) found their way into American Hymnals of various denominations. And so, on Thanksgiving, look for the English "Harvest Home Hymn" in our hymnal, the very American "Celebration Hymnal."

Starting “Conversations” with Older Adults Before the Needs Arise

Seventy percent of us will need long-term care after age 65, yet few of us openly discuss care needs and wishes. Care Conversations™ is bringing people together to change this conversation trend. We’re providing information and resources to get people talking with loved ones, health care providers and industry experts. There may be a time when you or your loved one will no longer be able to care for themselves independently. Care Conversations focuses on people and the honest discussions needed to plan and prepare for the future. Finding care may seem difficult or even overwhelming at first. Whether you’re seeking care for yourself, or for a loved one such as a spouse, parent or sibling, Care Conversations can help you every step of the way. Worry less about tomorrow. Start a conversation today.

Care Conversations with your loved ones - To find the right care solution, you must first know what you’re looking for. Keep in mind care wants are just as important as care needs. Talking with your loved ones may seem difficult at times, but regular discussions ensure everyone is working toward the same goal. Care Conversations™ help loved ones discover personal preferences and wishes that they might not have otherwise known. These insights help narrow the search criteria and make it easier to find the right care solution.

5 Tips For Successful Care Conversations - Many of us avoid Care Conversations because we assume loved ones don’t want to discuss sensitive matters. These perceptions may not be reality. Loved ones may want to talk. The process may be easier than we think. We simply won’t know until we try, so it’s important to push past initial reservations and commit to taking action. Once you’ve made the decision to act, how do you go about initiating a delicate conversation? Even with the best intentions and strong determination, you may find yourself speechless. To improve your chances of Care Conversation success, follow these five tips:

1 Address the Who, Where, and When - The right mix of people, place, and timing will help set the right tone for a pleasant, productive Care Conversation. Because Care Conversations are likely to affect everyone, it’s worth trying to involve everyone. While it may seem tough to find a quiet moment, try to find a time when people are relaxed and receptive.

2 Be flexible - Unforeseen circumstances can alter even the best-laid plans. However eager we may be to “get it over with”, a Care Conversation should not be forced or rushed. Plan for a few hiccups. If a family member is running late or your loved one seems to be having a bad day, consider rescheduling. When you are able to start a conversation, be flexible about how long the discussion lasts and what, if anything, is accomplished.

3 Take the “right” approach - Everyone’s situation is different, so there is no one-size-fits-all “right” approach. Consider your loved one’s preferences & tailor your tactics. Here are **three techniques** that can help you start a Care Conversation:

-Start With Small Talk. - Look for natural conversation starters. For example, if you’re helping an aging relative run errands or cook, you might ask, “What’s the best part of the day for you?” or “What’s the hardest?” Giving loved ones the opportunity to talk on their own terms makes Care Conversations casual and less intimidating.

-Turn The Tables - Talk about others in similar situations to avoid putting loved ones on the defensive about their own circumstances. Ask aging relatives if they cared for their parents or grandparents. If so, what was the experience like? What might they have done differently? You can also share your life and care plans. Mention your steps to prepare a will or advance directive, and ask for input and assistance.

-Express A Worry - Voicing concern can help loved ones see care discussions in a new light. You might say, “I’m worried that someday I’ll be making decisions on your behalf. I want to be sure I make the right ones.” This approach puts Care Conversations in the proper context of cooperative planning.

4 Ask specific questions - Be specific in your questions to fully understand the situation and level of need. You might ask: Do you feel comfortable driving to the bank? What about driving at night? How often do you go to the grocery store? Is it hard to bring in groceries? What do you worry about? How does it feel to be 80 (or 90 or 100)? What do you talk about with your friends? What would you like me to know that I don’t yet? You don’t have to tiptoe around questions; you can also ask what weighs on your heart. For example, if your loved one seems to struggle with a fear of dying, you might simply ask, “Are you afraid?” Honest questions can make difficult situations easier, and offer greater peace of mind.

5 Remember, it’s not about you - The goal at this point is to simply gather information, listen and observe. While we can certainly help our loved ones make choices, we should be careful not to take over the decision-making process. If Care Conversations don’t go as well as you had hoped, don’t take it personally. Acknowledging and addressing changing care needs can be very difficult for everyone involved. If loved ones are reluctant to discuss topics such as personal finance, you might ask what bank they use or where they keep important documents. If a question prompts an unfavorable response, simply say, “I didn’t mean to upset you. I want to make sure I understand what you need.” Some conversations will turn out better than others. The important thing is to just keep trying and keep talking.

Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good. *Romans 12:21 (ESV)*

In our fallen world, evil is abundant and confrontational. That challenges us with opportunities to witness for Christ and minister to the lost on His behalf. By so doing, we display a worldview focused on eternity and love. "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God" (*Matt. 5:9*).

In the last seven verses of *Romans 12*, Paul lists actions that begin with blessing those who persecute us and concludes with feeding hungry enemies (v. 20). The intervening points include empathy (v.15), humility (v.16), never repay evil for evil (v.17), seek peace (v.18), and avoid vengeance, which is God's work, not ours, because we have neither the right nor the understanding to do vengeance justly (v.19). This is offering our bodies as living sacrifices, holy and acceptable to God as true spiritual worship (*Rom. 12:1*). It shows that we are being transformed by renewed minds (*Rom. 12:2*).

Repaying evil with kindness can de-stabilize hostility and improve relationships (*Prov. 15:1*); one way to destroy enemies is to make friends of them. However, this risks suffering more evil on Christ's behalf. Natural man loves darkness rather than the light (*John 3: 19-21*). The Bible teaches that "everyone who wants to live a godly life in Jesus Christ will be persecuted" (*2 Tim. 3:12*). The closer we walk with Jesus, the more likely we will be persecuted because our lifestyle challenges worldliness. But remember, Jesus promised great rewards for those who suffer for Him (*Matt 5:10-12*), and we are to show grace to others as God has showered grace on us. This shows the supernatural power of the Gospel.

With God's help, we can be peacemakers instead of agitators.
