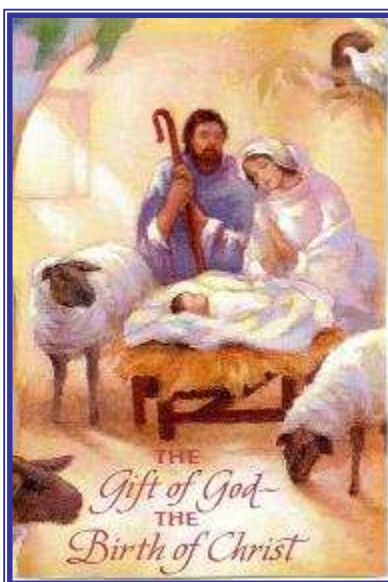

## *December at FPCD*

One of my fun "toys," as the catalogs refer to electronic items, is a small chest of bells. At this time of the year, although Advent is just begun, they play Christmas carols. What a wonderful experience to sit and enjoy the songs of Christmas - the rooms full of Christmas decorations - the beautiful Christmas trees - and family. Truly a blessing.

Unfortunately the joy and warmth feeling is dulled by the reality of the time in which we live. While we might like to sit by the fireplace with chestnuts roasting - the world is aflame with war and the rumors of war. Pope Francis has called upon Christians to weep.... for God weeps....Jesus weeps... at his creation- consumed with hatred wars, sufferings...and death. It was not supposed to be this way you know. Jesus came to bring peace to the world. Forgiveness/love was to be the way - as we have been forgiven -forgive; loved - love.

Human Sin got in the way - the best and the brightest from Camelot - with their brilliant minds and clever hands have created a world of woe. Antoine Leiris is the husband of one of the 130 killed by Islamic Terrorists in Paris. He shared his soul on Facebook with his post: "you will not have my hatred." He begins (in French) "Friday night you stole the life of an exceptional being, the love of my life, the mother of my son, but you will not have my hatred. I do not know who are and I do not want to know; you are dead souls. If God, for which you kill blindly, made us in his image, every bullet in the body of my wife has been a wound in his heart."

"So I will not give you the privilege of hating you. You certainly sought it, but replying to hatred with anger would be giving in to the same ignorance which made you into what you are. You want me to be frightened, that I should look into the eyes of my fellow citizens with distrust, that I sacrifice my freedom for security. You lost, I will carry on, as before."

He continued: "I saw her this morning," Leiris said of his wife Helene. "finally, after nights and days of waiting. She was as beautiful as when she left on Friday evening, as beautiful as when I fell madly in love with her more than 12 years ago. I am of course, devoted by heartbreak, I'll cede you that little victory, but it will be short lived. I know that she will be with us every day and that we will meet again in a paradise of free souls to which you will never have access."

Lewis closed by promising to raise his son happy and free. "There are only two of us, my son and I, but we are stronger than all the armies of the world. Moreover, I have no more time to grant to you. I must go to Melvil who is waking up from his nap. He is just 17 months old. He will eat his snack like he does every day, then we will play like we do every day and every day of his life this little boy will affront you by being happy and free, because you will not have his hatred either.

I envision God watching over Golgotha - with broken heart at his son's lifeless body - temple cloth torn - earth quaked - darkness all around....but then.... but then... a stone was rolled away.... He Lives...Dear friends in Christ that is what this season is all about -- a babe born - He set us - free souls - in God's creation which we have besmirched but cannot destroy...God is with us every day and nothing in this whole world can ever separate us from the love of God in Jesus Christ, our Risen Lord! The Terrorists will not defeat the love of God...no, they will never know the paradise of free souls for they will not have access.

Let these days prepare your minds, souls, and hearts for the coming....of His days! Amen and Amen.

## Musings from Pastor Mike, CRE

Young Adult & Adult CE Director and Youth Groups Leader

### The E.P.I.C. Style of Learning in Worship

I have noticed that many young people have been staying away or dropping out of the traditional, mainline church. Some have told me that they prefer a service that begins later on a Saturday or on a Sunday evening. Others have told me that they are looking for something that is less liturgical and more casual. Still others have shared with me that they are drawn to a more ancient form of worship with candles, incense, stained glass, and other details that appeal to the senses. But most have spoken about how they are having difficulty relating to worship. This is mainly because “post-moderns” learn differently than us “moderns” do, and have a distinct mind-set on how they desire and long to participate in worship. This was reinforced recently when I had coffee at Starbucks with a twenty-something from our own congregation. She remarked to me that she was spiritually hungry for a message and worship service much like the one that she had when she was at college. It was evident that she was describing a service that was experiential, participatory, image-based, and relational (E.P.I.C.). Likewise, a regular at *Converge* talked with me the other night about how he will most likely never step into a typical church service again because he cannot “live with the top-down structure of the typical worship and message”. He desires participatory relationship, interaction, questioning and guidance to be the main-stay of his Christian, worship experience.

Martin Luther reformed the sermon into an academic lecture as the centerpiece of worship, a one-way, authoritative, top-down model. But, as Pastor Rick Chromey, D. Min. writes in *Sermons Reimagined, Preaching to a Fluid Culture*, the Web culture has shattered this 500-year old wineskin, making everyone an influencer and partner and desiring to contribute to worship as a participant, not simply as a bystander. I know that this can make those of us trained at seminary as a “Sage from the Stage” nervous, but it can also be exciting and challenging to become a “Guide from the Side”. Making a message so relevant that members of a family of faith can reproduce and live-out the topic spoken on Sunday morning (or in my case, mostly on Saturday evenings) to friends, family, and co-workers during the week is a goal that most pastors desire.

Let me be very clear on the focus of this article that I am penning. It’s not about changing the message of the gospel, but it is about changing the methodology of making that Biblical message relevant, one that sticks, and is transformational.

Much preaching today in churches across the nation is expository, which dissects (exposes) passages of scripture and then explains and applies the truths discovered. While I was trained in expository preaching and I appreciate it, I admit that I struggle with any method that reduces scripture to something akin to a seminary lecture. The Word of God is living, active and is full of narratives (stories). Narratives draw listeners into the cultural context and the lives of the characters. Narrative preaching reveals the story behind the story, hence the great impact that people’s personal testimonies have on each other.


Narrative preaching is only part of the story...a speaker must also include substantial interaction. To be effective with emerging generations, we must also guide conversations about the selected text, answering questions, and inspiring insight through video clip, personal testimony, or experiential activity. As preachers, we are not the source of information (God is, as expressed through Holy Scripture) but instead, we are the resources. Pastor Chromey states that, “Postmodern narrative, interactive preaching offers up stories, lens, and orthopraxy (right behavior), as opposed to modern propositional, expository preaching which proposes solutions, frames, and orthodoxy (right thinking)”. The goal of conversational narrative preaching is much like what John the Baptist said about Jesus, recorded in John 3:30, “He must become greater. I must become less.” Our role as pastors is to reveal the Messiah to others. It is not about our profound words, penetrating insights, or powerful applications.

I am not saying I have all the answers, because quite frankly, I don’t. I am simply trying to meet the need of many young adults who are spiritually falling through the cracks of our current church structure and liturgy. I know that what I prescribe is much easier to do on a Saturday evening at *Converge* or at *Saturday Night Alive* with 20-30 people, than it may be for me to do on a Sunday morning with 200-300 people, but that is the challenge that the Holy Spirit has given me, as I work intensely to see the church grow in numbers with young adults playing a part in something new and different. I know that many young adults desire **Experiential, Participatory, Image-based, and Conversational (E.P.I.C.)** worship that reflects that faith is not an academic subject, but is a relationship with our one and only Triune God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Thanks for being patient with me (especially thanks to Pastor Don Wright, a highly competent and creative communicator for over 50 years who has finely honed his own, distinctive style), as I continue to assist young adults in engaging in a meaningful relationship with our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. ## A Christmas Reunion – True Story

The brand new pastor and his wife, newly assigned to their first ministry to reopen a church in suburban Brooklyn, arrived in early October excited about their opportunities. When they saw their church, it was very run down and needed much work. They set a goal to have everything done in time to have their first service on Christmas Eve.

They worked hard, repairing pews, plastering walls, painting, etc., and on December 18th they were ahead of schedule and just about finished. On December 19th a terrible tempest - a driving rainstorm - hit the area and lasted for two days. On the 21st, the pastor went over to the church. His heart sank when he saw that the roof had leaked, causing a large area of plaster about 20 feet by 8 feet to fall off the front wall of the sanctuary just behind the pulpit, beginning about head high.

The pastor cleaned up the mess on the floor, and not knowing what else to do but postpone the Christmas Eve service, headed home. On the way he noticed that a local business was having a flea market type sale for charity so he stopped in. One of the items was a beautiful, handmade, ivory colored, crocheted tablecloth with exquisite work, fine colors and a Cross embroidered right in the center. It was just the right size to cover up the hole in the front wall. He bought it and headed back to the church.

By this time it had started to snow. An older woman running from the opposite direction was trying to catch the bus. She missed it. The pastor invited her to wait in the warm church for the next bus 45 minutes later. She sat in a pew and paid no attention to the pastor while he got a ladder, hangers, etc., to put up the tablecloth as a wall tapestry. The pastor could hardly believe how beautiful it looked and it covered up the entire problem area.

Then he noticed the woman walking down the center aisle. Her face was like a sheet. "Pastor," she asked, "where did you get that tablecloth?" The pastor explained. The woman asked him to check the lower right corner to see if the initials, EBG were crocheted into it there. They were. These were the initials of the woman, and she had made this tablecloth 35 years before, in Austria.

The woman could hardly believe it as the pastor told how he had just gotten the Tablecloth. The woman explained that before the war she and her husband were well-to-do people in Austria. When the Nazis came, she was forced to leave. Her husband was going to follow her the next week. She was captured, sent to prison and never saw her husband or her home again. The pastor wanted to give her the tablecloth; but she made the pastor keep it for the church. The pastor insisted on driving her home, which was the least he could do. She lived on the other side of Staten Island and was only in Brooklyn for the day for a housecleaning job.

What a wonderful service they had on Christmas Eve. The church was almost full. The music and the spirit were great. At the end of the service, the pastor and his wife greeted everyone at the door and many said that they would return.

One older man, whom the pastor recognized from the neighborhood, continued to sit in one of the pews and stare, and the pastor wondered why he wasn't leaving. The man asked him where he got the tablecloth on the front wall because it was identical to one that his wife had made years ago when they lived in Austria before the war and how could there be two tablecloths so much alike? He told the pastor how the Nazis came, how he forced his wife to flee for her safety, and he was supposed to follow her, but he was arrested and put in a prison. He never saw his wife or his home again all the 35 years in between.

The pastor asked him if he would allow him to take him for a little ride. They drove to Staten Island and to the same house where the pastor had taken the woman three days earlier. He helped the man climb the three flights of stairs to the woman's apartment, knocked on the door and he saw the greatest Christmas reunion he could ever imagine. **Story taken from [www.inspire21.com](http://www.inspire21.com) ~Chris Mayer**



**Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of God**  
(Matt. 5:3, NRSV)

In the Beatitudes, the Aramaic Jesus spoke had no verb; each statement was an exclamation (*Barclay*). Jesus said, “O the blessedness of the poor in spirit!” This structure also exists in Psalm 1, “O the blessedness of the man who walks...” Spiritual poverty is not just a pious hope; it exists, God blesses those with it, and here Jesus affirms them!

The poor in spirit are blessed by a divinely bestowed inner well-being that comes from experiencing a relationship with God by faith. This contrasts with the worldly pursuit of happiness based on riches, merriment, leisure, and abundance. Psalm 1 portrays a blessed man as living a full life meditating on and obeying Scripture.

The poor in spirit are humble because they clearly see their inability to satisfy God. So they turn to Him, trusting in His grace alone. Being repentant, they are blessed by a rebirth into faith. Trusting God for His forgiveness, they live with God now, sharing peace, love, and forgiveness toward all. The poor in spirit are the opposite of the proud in spirit!

Jesus is teaching that the Kingdom of God is a gift of God’s grace, not our achievement. It comes to those who know their need and humbly respond to God’s grace by faith in Christ. God’s kingdom cannot be earned by merit; but, it is available to all who will see themselves and God realistically and respond appropriately. We are to worship God in Spirit and in truth (*John 4:24*). See Isaiah 6 as an example.

**Master of Divinity at Calvin Seminary:** Jonathan will graduate with a Bachelor of Science degree in economics in December, and start the Master of Divinity program at Calvin Theological Seminary in February. He will participate in the distance program, commuting to Grand Rapids once per semester, so we will still live in Dearborn.

**Laura Continues Teaching:** Laura will continue to teach at Woodworth Middle School in Dearborn following her maternity leave, and Jonathan will take care of the baby while completing coursework at home. The plan is for Laura to continue to teach until Jonathan starts a paid/support raised position within the next couple years.

**Pastoral Residency Program at Woodside Bible Church:** Jonathan will start as a pastoral resident with Woodside Bible Church in Dearborn in 2016. The residency program offers a high-level pastoral leadership coaching program, sermon coaching from the church teaching team, and supervised pastoral responsibilities to prepare for senior church leadership. Residents will also participate in graduate level seminars at Woodside with Tim Keller, Francis Chan, Al Mohler, and other gifted pastors. We believe that this hands-on learning experience will be invaluable for preparing to be a pastor, and for God's calling on our lives.

**We'll Transition after the New Year:** We look forward to celebrating Advent and Christmas with you before leaving in January. We will still live and work in Dearborn, and hope to maintain the valuable friendships we have built with you over the past 4 ½ years. Thank you for your love, support and encouragement as a first-time youth director, in our marriage, and in preparing for our first child. You are very dear to us and we will always love our church family at First Presbyterian. Please pray for us as we seek to be obedient to God's voice and overcome the hurdles of parenthood ahead.
