Puzzle BROOCH


Make this keepsake to let your mom, grandma or aunt know that you wouldn't be complete without her!

What you need:


- Several old puzzle pieces

He is not here; He has risen --
Matthew 28:6; Mark 16:6; Luke 24:6

The Resurrection of Jesus Christ, after being crucified to pay for our sins, is the central fact of Christianity. It allows the Father to pardon us by His grace without compromising holiness, and it shows that the Father accepts Jesus' sacrifice on the Cross as the just payment for our sins. Anyone who receives Jesus as Lord and Savior on that basis, becomes a child of God (*John 1:12*). Why should anyone believe that the Resurrection is really true?

1. The disciples changed dramatically after believing reluctantly, and they never recanted despite suffering and martyrdom. People do not willingly suffer and die for a cause unless they are convinced it is true and good.

2. The main sermon theme of the early church was: "God has made this Jesus, whom you crucified, both Lord and Christ," raising Him from the dead (*Acts 2:36; 10:39-43; 13:30-37; 26:23*). Without the Resurrection, that message would have been rejected by those who lived in Palestine where it occurred. But instead, 3,000 in Jerusalem joined the church quickly (*Acts 2:41*).

3. Jesus' tomb was plugged by a huge rock, sealed, and guarded by Rome, to prevent anyone from stealing the body (*Matthew 27:62-28:10*); yet the tomb was emptied, and the risen Jesus appeared many times over 40 days (*Acts 1:3*) and to more

than 500 of the brothers at one time (*1 Corinthians 15:6*).

4. The four Gospels testifying to the Resurrection were written by different people to different audiences for different purposes with different details; yet when analyzed, they agree on the same key facts. Had they all said the same things, we might suspect collusion, but the complexity of these testimonies makes that impossible.

5. Without the Resurrection, there would be no New Testament - the Epistles would have no salvation to explain.

6. Believers justified through the Resurrection (*Romans 4:25*) became a great force for good world-wide. Those redeemed sinners produced charities, hospitals, schools, churches, missions, and changed lives, despite their sinfulness and severe persecution. Their ministries enhanced human dignity.

The Resurrection proves Jesus' divinity (*Romans 1:4*), another proof that God exists and is as Jesus revealed Him. Therefore, atheism and many religions are false (*Psalm 14:1*).

Such a beneficial truth must be shared. Therefore, proclaim and live by the Gospel so that others may find the new life in Christ that so greatly blesses us.

May is National Stroke Education Month

- Stroke is the **3rd leading cause of death** in the United States, killing over 176,000 people each year and is a leading cause of serious, long-term adult disability.

- Stroke is a **brain attack and is emergency event**, cutting off vital blood flow and oxygen to the brain.

Stroke can happen to anyone at any time, regardless of race, age or sex. However, African Americans have almost twice the risk of first-ever stroke compared to whites and each year 55,000 more women experience a first-time stroke than men.

Two Types of Stroke:

- Ischemic Stroke** occurs when arteries are blocked by blood clots or by gradual build-up of plaque and other fatty deposits. About 87 % of all strokes are ischemic.

- Hemorrhagic Stroke** occurs when a blood vessel in the brain breaks leaking blood into the brain. Hemorrhagic strokes account for thirteen % of all strokes, yet are responsible for 30% all stroke deaths.

- 2,000,000 brain cells die every minute during a stroke**, increasing the risk of permanent brain damage, disability or death. Recognizing symptoms and **acting FAST** to get medical attention can save a life and limit disabilities. The prevalence of **TIA's (transient ischemic attacks)** also known as "mini-strokes", increases with age. Up to 40% of all people who suffer a TIA will go on to experience a stroke.

Stroke is an Emergency! Act FAST and call 911!

Learning the warning signs of stroke, and acting fast when they occur, could save someone's life.

F = FACE Ask the person to smile. Does one side of the face droop?

A = ARM Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?

S = SPEECH Ask the person to repeat a simple sentence. Does the speech sound slurred or strange?

T = TIME if you observe any of these signs (independently or together), **call 9-1-1**

Reducing Risks; Stroke Prevention Guidelines:

1. **Know Blood Pressure.** High BP is a major risk factor if left untreated.

2. **Identify Atrial Fibrillation (Afib).** This is an abnormal heartbeat that can increase stroke by **500 %**. Afib can cause blood to pool in the heart and may form a clot and cause stroke.

3. **Stop Smoking.** Smoking doubles the risk of stroke.

4. **Know Cholesterol levels.** High levels can clog arteries and cause stroke.

5. **Control Alcohol Use.** Don't drink, or limit to no more than 2 per day. Remember, alcohol can interact with other drugs you are taking.

6. **Control Diabetes.** Keep blood sugar levels within normal limits to decrease risk.

7. **Manage Exercise and Diet.** Excess weight strains the circulatory system.

Treat Circulation Problems. Fatty deposits can block arteries carrying blood to the brain and lead to heart attack or stroke.

If you have any stroke symptoms, seek immediate medical attention!
